Wilderness Park: The Road to Recovery

In September 2020, the Bobcat Fire swept across the San Gabriel Mountains, swelling to over 116,000 acres. Thanks to incredible firefighting efforts, no structures were damaged in Arcadia, but the blaze left behind scarred slopes on the hillside above Wilderness Park. The damage from the fire only worsened from heavy winter rains that followed annually from 2021 through 2023, forcing Wilderness Park into a multi-year closure and leaving many wondering when this beloved space will reopen in Arcadia.

The Aftermath of a Significant Rainy Season



SEPTEMBER 2020

Post-wildfire, vegetation takes three to five years to recover and prevent devastating mudflows caused by rainfall on loose soil.



DECEMBER 2021

Before the hillside above Wilderness Park could recover from the fire, rainstorms in December unleashed eight feet of mud, boulders, and debris, burying paths, picnic areas, trees, and structures.



JANUARY 2023

Protective barriers were installed to prevent additional damage, but were no match for the rainstorms, where water was moving nearly 30 mph down the hillside, adding five more feet of mud.

What has been done to repair Wilderness Park?

In early 2023, Los Angeles County Public Works began removing mud, trees, and debris that was collected in the debris basin. Currently, a conveyor belt is set up in Wilderness Park for sediment removal from the Santa Anita Dam. Once the sediment removal is complete, Arcadia will decide on the most effective cleanup approach. Debris removal and the park reopening will remain a challenge until the County repairs the bridge at Wilderness Park and the sediment conveyor belt is removed, which is not scheduled for completion until 2025.

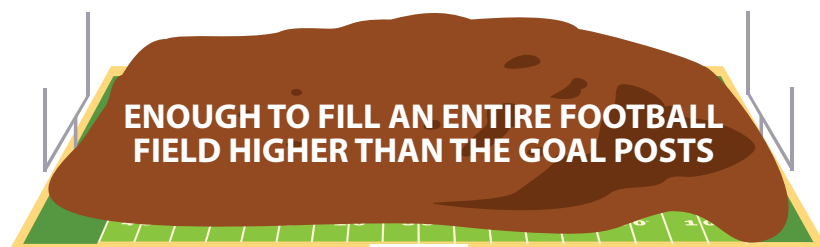
What will it cost to restore Wilderness Park?

Tackling a cleanup project this large requires the collaboration of numerous agencies and comes with a multi-million dollar price tag, making it impossible for the City to take this on alone.

Arcadia is relying on agencies such as the State's Office of Emergency Services (CalOES) and the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) for financial support to help with debris removal and repairs, estimated to cost between \$4.0 and \$7.0 million. Obtaining this level of federal and state support lengthens the process, but helps divert costs from Arcadia taxpayers.



In total, there's nearly 27,000 cubic yards of debris in Wilderness Park. What does 27,000 cubic yards look like?

No Dumping Fats, Oils, & Grease (FOGs)

Fats, Oils, and Grease (FOGs) come from meat fats in food scraps, cooking oil, shortening, lard, butter, margarine, gravy, and food products such as mayonnaise, salad dressings, and sour cream. FOGs should never be poured down the drain as they create blockages in pipes and can damage sewer lines, leading to unwanted back flow of wastewater in homes and businesses. Consequently, exposure to untreated wastewater is a public-health hazard.



What To Do with FOGs Instead

- Used FOGs can be properly disposed of by pouring or scraping into a sealable container and placed into the black trash cart.
- Wipe pots, pans, and dishes with dry paper towels before rinsing or washing them, then throw away the paper towels in the black trash cart.

Tips to Keep your Organics Cart Clean

Since January 2022, SB 1383 requires all residents and businesses to recycle organic waste like food scraps and lawn clippings in the organics cart. Organic waste should be placed in the cart without any plastic bags or compostable bags. This can be downright yucky, so here are some tips to reduce the "yuck":

- **LINE IT** – Line your cart with newspaper or paper bags.
- **LAYER IT** – Use leaves and other yard waste as a layer between food waste.
- **STORE IT** – To reduce odors and pests, keep your cart in a shady, ventilated area.
- **SET IT OUT** – Set your cart out on trash day, even if it isn't full.
- **RINSE IT** – Rinse out cart with a water and vinegar solution and let dry before using.
