Schedule Given For Payments

The schedule for the distribution of third paychecks to Center residents was announced today by Gene W. Wilbur, assistant Center manager.

Beginning at 12:30 p.m. today, the first batch of paychecks will be issued to camouflage workers in the Grandstand.

Issuance of checks to the other workers will begin Monday at the cashier's office with six windows open for this purpose.

Wilbur and Center Cashier Clyde Lambourne collaborated in arranging the following schedule:

MONDAY: Blue mess, Red mess, Green mess.

TUESDAY: Utilities, Fire department, Police department, Supply and Warehouse section.

WEDNESDAY: White mess, Orange mess, Yellow mess, Commissary warehouse.

THURSDAY: Lodging, Canteens, Hospital and Dispensary, Recreation, Education, Welfare, Administrative, Information, PACE-MAKER.

Cashier windows for the distribution of checks will be open 9 to 11:15 a.m. and 12:15 to 4 p.m. on Monday and Wednesday. They will be open from 4:30 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday.

The payroll for the period between May 16 and June 15 amounts to \$44,464 for 6,830 workers, it was stated.

Workers must follow the schedule to obtain their checks, Lambourne said.

Shower, Washday Regulations Set

To ease the cesspool drainage problem, a schedule of closed days for laundries and showers was announced today by H. Russell Amory, Center manager.

All laundries will be closed each Wednesday while showers will shut down in accordance with the following schedule:

Shower No. 1, 5 Porter's Cap--Saturday.

Shower No. 2, south end of Seabiscuit--Sunday.

Shower No. 3, Seabiscuit and He Did--Friday.

Shower No. 4, 32 Whirlaway--Thursday.

Shower No. 5, 37 Equipoise--Monday.

Shower No. 6, 15 Third street--Tuesday.

Main Shower, front of Grandstand--Wednesday.

Sanitation regulations have been established with the following prohibitions:

1. Use of washbowls for laundering.

2. All laundry work except in laundries.

3. Throwing of wash water onto paving and into ditches.

4. Tampering with showers.

Shoe Supply Now Exhausted

In the meantime, a new system of distribution is being prepared, Barber said. The new procedure will replace the old one when distribution begins again.

Mess Halls Vie For Honors

Center mess halls will be judged for all-around efficiency and cleanliness beginning this week, it was reported today by the Mess division.

The mess hall with the highest score will receive a large pennant with the initial "E", denoting excellence, superimposed on it.

The pennant will be displayed outside the winning mess hall.

Judgings will be made every week by three administrative officials. The six basic standards for judgment:

1. General sanitation.

2. Food preparation and serving.

3. Personnel.

4. Food storage and refrigeration.

5. Dish washing.

6. Fly control.

Hereafter packages of foodstuffs weighing more than 15 pounds will not be delivered to Center residents through the post office or any other entry into the Center, warned Gene Wilbur, assistant Center manager.

Blue Mess Keeps Busy Feeding Night Workers

Of the Center's many mess halls, the Blue mess is the only one to feed night workers, revealed Jimmy Nishimura, head cook, with pardonable pride.

"Our work begins after supper and ends early in the morning," he asserted in an interview one night this week.

While he was talking a band of policemen came walking into the mess hall,

blinking their eyes trying to get accustomed to the light.

Looking at the policemen Nishimura said, "We feed an average of 75 policemen, about 45 firemen and from 20 to 30 warehousemen. The warehouse crew really works hard and comes in hungry."

In addition to feeding night workers, the night crew helps prepare meals for the new day, and the

"On a hot day it's a hot job, but it's ideal in the winter," commented Jack Tabata, in describing his job as foreman of the burning crew at the dumps west of the main track.

All the combustible trash of the Center is burned by Tabata's crew. "We do most of the burning in the morning while it is still cool," he explained.

From 75 to 100 plates from the mess halls have been salvaged by the boys. "We've also saved 500 milk bottles before the children with slingshots come out here and break them," Tabata continued.

Among the many articles that slip into trash cans are books, magazines, soft drink bottles, spoons, jam glasses and coupon books.

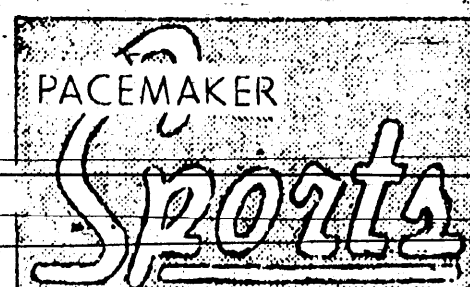

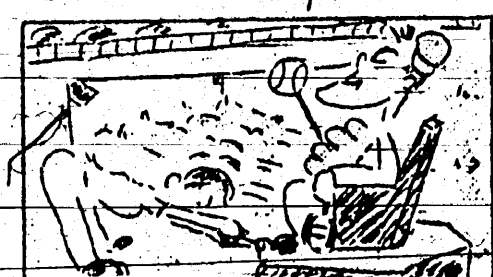

Second Front Now for Victory

A recent letter to President Roosevelt from 45 residents of the Tanforan assembly center, reads:

"Because of our situation, we regret we have not been able as yet to participate in the war effort of this country in the way of production and combat....It is our conviction that this people's war must end in victory for the Allied Nations.... We therefore call for an offensive-- A SECOND FRONT NOW--for Victory."



That the evacuees are in accord with the views voiced by American leaders is an indication that, in spite of being denied active participation in the total war against fascism, they are not unaware of the war and all that America's victory means.

Their letter is in agreement with the views of Vice President Henry Wallace who says: "The time to strike hard is rapidly approaching. By so doing, I am convinced that our total eventual losses will be reduced and victory hastened."

It is America's victory we want--without delay.
